Bringing the World to the Classroom

The **Building Cultural Bridges** (**BCB**) **Program** is connecting US and Namibian students right in their own classrooms. Moving beyond the traditional pen pal letters criss-crossing the earth, Educators of America has implemented CiscoDX80 devices to facilitate live face-to-face conversations between students.

Teachers and students alike are forming relationships and taking on collaborative projects such animal conservation and water security and using the video technology to share ideas, discuss project components, and present their findings.

The BCB program has recently been awarded New York State Department of Education's Learning Technology Grant and will be expanding its growth over the next three years.

Building Hope in Namibia

This past June, a delegation of eight individuals joined members of EOA and traveled to the Sub-Saharan African nation of Namibia on a capacity building mission. The focus of the mission was to build the capacities of teachers and administration in inclusive education practices such as positive reinforcement, approaches to behavior management, and constructing math and literacy centers. Additionally, part of the team worked with 70 6th grade students from two schools on improving their team building, entrepreneurship, self-esteem and hygienic skills through hands-on activities and games.

The two week-long trip provided immense amounts of learning -both to the EOA team and the Namibian teachers and students. From language learning to learning how to play foursquare, every moment was discovering more about one another and sharing experiences. There's conundrum that some believe exists with cross-cultural exchange and human development. It is that they are mutually exclusive, yet, we believe that without relationships, you cannot have human development. It's an essential component.
